

CCS:

The CCS program provides diagnostic and treatment services, medical case management, and physical and occupational therapy services to children under age 21 with CCS-eligible medical conditions. Examples of CCS-eligible conditions include, but are not limited to, chronic medical conditions such as cystic fibrosis, hemophilia, cerebral palsy, heart disease, cancer, traumatic injuries, and infectious diseases producing major sequelae. CCS also provides medical therapy services that are delivered at public schools.

The CCS program is administered as a partnership between county health departments and the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS). Currently, approximately 70 percent of CCS-eligible children are also Medi-Cal eligible. The Medi-Cal program reimburses their care. The cost of care for the other 30 percent of children is split equally between CCS Only and CCS Healthy Families. The cost of care for CCS Only is funded equally between the State and counties. The cost of care for CCS Healthy Families is funded 65 percent federal Title XXI, 17.5 percent State, and 17.5 percent county funds.

In addition, Insurance Code Sections 12693.62, 12693.64 and 12693.66, relating to the California's Healthy Families Program, provides that the services authorized by the CCS program to treat a Healthy Families plan's subscriber's CCS-eligible medical condition are excluded from the plan's responsibilities. The participating health plan's responsibility for providing all covered medically necessary health care and case management services changes at the time that CCS eligibility is determined by the CCS program for the plan subscriber. The health plan is still responsible for providing primary care and prevention services not related to the CCS-eligible medical condition to the plan subscriber so long as they are within the Healthy Families program scope of benefits. The health plan also remains responsible for children referred to but not determined to be eligible for the CCS program.

CDHP:

Medi-Cal Children and Youth

All Medi-Cal recipients from birth to age 21 are eligible for CHDP scheduled periodic health assessments and services based on the federally mandated Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment (EPSDT) Program.

Non-Medi-Cal Children and Youth

CHDP provides a schedule of periodic health services to non-Medi-Cal children and youth from birth to age 19 years whose family income is equal to or less than 200 percent of the federal income guidelines. All children and youth are eligible for health assessments based on the same schedule or periodicity used for Medi-Cal children and youth.

CPSP: Comprehensive Perinatal Services Program (CPSP)

Goals

To decrease the incidence of low birth weight in infants.

To improve the outcome of every pregnancy.

To give every baby a healthy start in life.

To lower health care costs by preventing catastrophic illness in infants and children.

Program Activities

Medi-Cal-eligible women receive comprehensive services, including prenatal care, health education, nutrition services, and psychosocial support for up to 60 days after delivery of their infants. Local health department staff offer technical assistance and consultation to potential and approved providers in the implementation of CPSP program standards. The MCAH Program develops standards and policies; provides technical assistance and consultation to the local health perinatal services coordinators; and, maintains an ongoing program of training for all CPSP practitioners throughout the state.

Who Benefits

Medi-Cal-eligible women and their infants who receive the services of CPSP. The Medi-Cal program and the population of California with healthy birth outcomes and lower short- and long-term health care costs.

Who Provides Services

Over 1,500 Medi-Cal providers are approved as CPSP providers, in both the fee-for-service and managed care systems. Providers include physicians, physician medical groups, community clinics, hospital outpatient clinics, alternative birth centers, certified nurse midwives, and certified pediatric or family nurse practitioners.

Practitioners include physicians, nurse midwives, physician assistants, nurses, social workers, health educators, nutritionists, and comprehensive perinatal health workers. County health departments assist local providers in meeting CPSP certification requirements and provide them technical assistance after the MCAH Program certifies them.
